Unity in the Body

Grace and peace
in the name of our

It is with great joy
and good humor
that we weekly
welcome visitors to

our services with a loaf of bread. As the visitors receive the bread, I delight in informing them that the gift of the loaf is a visible sign to remind all of us of our unity in the Body of Christ: no peanut butter, no jelly, just a lot of love.

To have a loaf offered and received is more than a sign; it is a sacrament. It is a means of grace, rooted in God's graciously hospitable act in Jesus Christ, empowered by the Holy Spirit. It is amnansis and prolepsis, remembrance and anticipation of "Christ's final victory..." when we shall "feast at his heavenly banquet," as we rehearse during our communion liturgy.

That sense of connection is heightened on the first Sunday in October, as the larger church celebrates World Communion Sunday. Begun in the 1930s by the Presbyterian Church, it is now recognized and practiced widely by several Christian faith communities. On Oct. 6, we too will engage the reality that we are one at the table with Christians all over the world!

As United Methodists, we not only gather to celebrate communion in worship. We also work toward the goal of serving God in life-changing ministries. World Communion Sunday calls the church to reach out to all people and model diversity among God's children.

When churches like AUMC take the special collection on World Communion Sunday, the offering is used to equip racial- and ethnic-minority students in the United States and around the world to transform the church and communities.

Fifty percent of the special offering goes to the World Communion Scholarship Program of the General Board of Global Ministries. From Asia-Pacific, Africa, Latin America, the Caribbean, Europe and the Middle East, as well as from racial and ethnic minorities in the United States, Crusade scholars are committed to the life and mission of the Church, as well as to its ministry to society and the world. Since the inception of the program in 1944, the Crusade Scholarship Program has funded nearly 4,000 students.

In addition to a special offering on Oct. 6, **everyone attending AUMC on World Communion Sunday is invited to dress in clothing representative of their native country**, or their ancestors' birthplace, or a country in which they have lived or visited. Wearing costumes from around the world will help us as we commune with Christians from all over the world working together to serve God.

Take a Seat

Hospitality seems to be Jesus' central mission. On the road, on the mountain, on the boat, in a stranger's house, by the shore, Jesus is continually inviting people to come closer and experience

God in a real way. Recently I was asked, "What would exclude a person from receiving communion?" Of course, my answer was "no one is excluded." If anything, the communion table is an invitation in itself to include as many as possible. When Jesus instituted the Lord's Supper he made a new covenant with all of us in which we are all included: "Drink from it and eat from it, all of you."

As I keep learning and growing in ministry, I come to know a God who wants and desires all of us to be in relationship with the Creator and with one another. I find this not just fascinating but utterly impressive. Let's imagine that a king is throwing this great feast and all the major newscasts are transmitting what will happen in the party—the food and entertainment and how exquisite the decorations will be. The invitations go out and everyone gets one, yes even the homeless, the poor, the hungry, the sick, the untouchables, even people we dislike. That's what I find at the communion table: hospitality and an invitation to everyone to come and take a seat. Not to wait outside or eat in the kitchen, but to come and join in the heavenly banquet with the one making the invitation—Jesus Christ.

As we celebrate World Communion, I would like to call your attention to people who do not feel welcome

Mission Trip to Appalachia: Two teams from Annandale UMC left Sept. 22 for a week-long mission trip to Wyoming County, W.VA. The group will participate with the Appalachia Service Project (ASP) doing home repairs for families in the Benton and Pineville areas of West Virginia. They will return to AUMC on Saturday, Sept. 28.

Kairos Prayers and Cookie time: The Kairos Prison Ministry Team is preparing to share God's love with the men at the Greensville Correctional Center in Jarratt, VA, Oct. 24 - 27. Your prayer support for this weekend is important. If you would like to have your name included on the Prayer Chain that is shared with the men at GRCC, the Prayer Chain sign-up list is on the table under the video screen in the Atrium. Also, the Annandale UMC Team is responsible for baking 700 dozen homemade cookies. Cookies are a tangible expression of our love and the only gift that Kairos can give to inmates. A cookie sign-up sheet, prison approved cookie recipes, and instructions are also on the table in the Atrium. If you cannot bake cookies but want to make a donation for baking supplies, make your check payable to AUMC, designated for Kairos Cookies, by Sunday, Oct. 13.
