National Children's Sabbath: Beating Swords into Plowshares

Violence. Poverty. Abuse. Sickness. Depression. Fear. These are themes saturating our news and suffocating our nation. One does not have to venture far to see the impact of living in a broken world – finding hurting souls longing for connection and struggling to make ends meet. Some of the greatest sufferers of these devastations are our nation's children and youth – voiceless victims that feel trapped in cycles bound to repeat themselves generation after generation.

The statistics are staggering: we could discuss our high infant mortality rates (every 20 minutes a baby dies before his or her first birthday), or our crippling high school drop-out records (one student every eight seconds during the school year), or how eight young people are killed each day by a firearm, or how four students under the age of 18 will successfully take their own lives before the day is over. In the time that it has taken you to read this far into the article – another child has been born into poverty's harsh conditions.

But instead of considering figures, God has called us to consider the individual – that hundredth lamb that has wandered from the fold. Jesus stated "Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these." If children and youth matter to God, we must strive to have our children and youth matter to us.

On Sunday, Oct. 20, Annandale UMC will participate in our yearly Children's Sabbath, which is a service dedicated to the promotion and wellbeing of our children and youth, both inside and outside of our congregation. We will have times for prayer and reflection, along with discussing ways that we can actively get involved in protecting, educating, and uplifting this next generation. We hope that you will join us as we work together to answer God's commission to consider the "least of these."

Discerning God's Will

Grace and peace in the name of our Savior!

I write today in the midst of our preparations for the annual business meeting of the church known in Methodism as "Charge Conference." We are counting heads, we are dotting "i's" and

crossing "t's." But the heart and the soul of who we are and what we do are not contained by forms. It is in the faithful pursuit of God's intention for us as individuals and as a church.

More of who we are and what we do at AUMC has been captured by the discernment process which we have pursued over the course of the past year. We have spoken and listened. We have gathered reams of demographic data. We have researched and we have prayed. The result of all of the above has been compiled, and was the grist for our time of retreat held on Aug. 23-24 at the 4-H retreat center in Chevy Chase, MD.

The discernment results gladdened our hearts in several ways. We heard that there is general consensus that we are doing well on the items that were lifted by our 2010 Discernment Process: we were creating programming with and focusing on Young Adults; we continue to have passion around and engagement with significant local, national, and international mission work.

There were things of concern reported among us as well: the loss of our ESL program; the need for better use of updated technology; a reworking of our outreach hospitality. Fortunately, we found that we were already at work in many of these areas. We have a new, more robust website that is easier to negotiate and upon which videos of our most recent sermons are posted; we are making better use of the social media – Facebook, Twitter, Blogging and so forth. Persons new to our community of faith are joining with seasoned members to present the face of hospitality, with new methods of following up with visitors.

We also followed the questions that our discernment raised: How can we do better at reaching the greater Annandale community, particularly Hispanic Latino persons, and, given our experience as one community of faith in two locations, what was the best use of our Heritage Drive location? All that said and done, it was during that time that we wrestled with the question: "In light of this, what is God calling us to be and do?" There was a clear call to a more faithful witness to connecting to our Hispanic Latino brothers and sisters, first through mission, then through a Spanish language service. This would mean the phasing out of our Sunday morning

service on Heritage Drive, and opening that site up for other purposes.

A transition team is now at work on the process. We anticipate that our English language services there will cease by the end of this year, and that something new will begin early in 2014. We will need everyone's prayers as we begin this new part of our journey with God. There will be difficulties, but there will be joy as well; joy born of the knowledge that new persons will be brought into relationship with Jesus Christ in Annandale. Lives will be changed and transformed. Hospitality will be offered and received. All because we took the time to listen for the voice of God in the midst of all we do. For that I am thankful to God and to you.
