Stand for Children

"Whoever welcomes this child in my name welcomes me."

- Luke 9:48a



Dear Friends,

I was in my first year at Harvard Divinity School when I was approached by a staff member of the Children's Defense Fund. I was invited to be a member of a committee to develop a national student leadership network for children. Every month, I travelled from Cambridge to Washington, DC to meet with other students, university administrators, and clergy from throughout the country to discuss issues confronting our nation's at-risk children and youth. I had worked with urban youth in tutoring programs and as a youth minister. Through these experiences, I had seen first-hand how national statistics on poverty, violence, education, abuse, etc., affected the personal lives of individual youth and their families. Through these experiences, I moved beyond sound bites and stereotypes and learned the names and faces of children who were suffering, children who could not vote, lobby, or advocate for themselves, children who needed people to speak on their behalf.

Through the Children's Defense Fund, I attended the Institute for Child Advocacy Ministry held annually at the former Alex Haley Farm in Tennessee. I met other faith leaders from across the country who also worked with at-risk youth. Together we prayed, studied, and strategized about how we could make a meaningful difference in the lives of children and youth in America. We reflected on how people of faith could help fulfill the Children's Defense Fund mission "to ensure every child a Healthy Start, a Head Start, a Fair Start, a Safe Start and a Moral Start in life and successful passage to adulthood with the help of caring families and communities."

This past Sunday at AUMC, we participated in the National Observance of Children's Sabbath. An initiative of the Children's Defense Fund, Children's Sabbath is celebrated by people of faith throughout the country as a time to lift up children in need and to answer the call to pursue justice, mercy, and compassion. I hope that you were inspired by this worship service to participate in one of our church's ministries that help at-risk youth. I also hope that we will feel called, as a community of faith, into deeper conversation about how we can work for justice on behalf of all God's children, to welcome them as we would welcome Christ, and to boldly stand for children to create a more compassionate and just world.

AARP Safe Driving Course for Seniors: Monday and Tuesday, **Oct. 28 and 29**, 10 a.m. – 3 p.m. (an hour off for lunch), Media Center. For those who have completed the course in the past, many insurers require you to take the course every three years to maintain the rate reduction. AUMC has been, and always will be, an "open", welcoming church. However, because of concerns for safety and security, the Trustees voted to upgrade several door locks. The upgraded security is expected to be completed by the end of this year. For those coming to worship on Sunday mornings, entrance to the church will be the same: the doors regularly unlocked Sunday mornings will continue to be unlocked. The security upgrades will be most noticeable during business hours, Monday through Friday, when children, parents, visitors and staff will need to use one of the three doors which will have new security locks. More information will be included in the future issues of the Witness and future Sunday bulletins.
