2014 Lenten Mission Projects

We are a congregation that lives our love of God through service to those in need, whether they live in our neighborhood or on distant shores. Acting on AUMC's overall mission to Love God, Love Neighbor and Serve the World, we support our local community and the world through service, prayer, financial support and fellowship. Our mission outreach is structured to ensure that everyone, young and old alike, can participate.

AUMC's Mission Committee has identified seven Lenten Mission Projects for 2014 and set a fund raising goal of \$75,000. They are:



Local Projects

- + Poe Middle School Food Ministry - \$10,000 to grant local children the certainty of a hot dinner each week and to pay for food to distribute to those in need in the Annandale area. (Also a focus of Children's Ministry/KIMyr Lenten Mission Project Pantry for Poe)
- + Camp Highroad - \$10,000 to fund a variety of projects to allow this Methodist adventure camp to continue serving groups of all ages year-round. AUMC's Camp Highroad work weekend is May 16-18.
- + Heritage Drive Campus Ministries - \$10,000 to provide initial resources to launch new ministries in the area.

International Projects

- + Stop Hunger Now - \$10,000 to provide 40,000 meals for those in need across 75 countries. (The snowed-out February event has been rescheduled for May 31.)
- + Brazil Mission Trip - \$10,000 to continue to support the Shade and Fresh Water Program.
- + Haiti - \$10,000 to help rebuild orphanages, homes and schools severely damaged in recent earthquake and hurricanes.
- + Mozambique - \$15,000 to complete a men's dormitory in the Combine Mission compound for the investment in the future of Mozambique.

Dear Friends,

We are in the midst of our Lenten study and sermon series based on *The Prodigal God* by Timothy Keller. It has fallen to me to preach the sermon on the topic of sin. (I must have drawn the short straw!) The book chapter is titled "Redefining Sin." In this chapter, Keller identifies two paths utilized to seek happiness and fulfillment: the path of self-discovery and the path of moral conformity. The moral conformists seek to follow all of the moral rules. They correspond to the elder brother in the parable who looks down upon the younger brother for his waywardness. The self-discoverers eschew the moral rules determined to chart their own path. They correspond to the younger brother in the parable and tend to look down upon the elder brothers of the world for their religious self-righteousness.


According to Keller, both paths ultimately fall short because both place the self as savior rather than Christ. Both paths amount to a rebellion against God. The self-discoverer rebels by rejecting morality. The moral conformist rebels by seeking to control God through a strict adherence to morality. As in the parable, both can lead to estrangement from God. Yet God invites both to the feast of reconciliation and love.

I am intrigued by this analysis of the parable of the prodigal son. I believe that most parables call us to see ourselves in the parable to better understand our relationship to God. In this parable, however, I believe that Jesus (and now Keller) asks a more challenging question: where do we see the church in this parable? As a church, are we a group of younger brothers who have been returned home to God's love? Or are we the elder brothers who have obeyed all the rules and feel we deserve a better place at the table? Or are we a combination of the two? Would a modern day younger brother feel welcome at our church? Would he be greeted with the open arms of the father or the disdainful response of the elder brother?

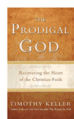
In my sermon this Sunday, we will seek to understand how all of us are ultimately in the same predicament.

Indeed, all have sinned and fall short of God's glory. Moreover, all are invited to the table of grace and welcomed into the arms of God's love.

Kairos Prayers and Cookies: AUMC's Kairos Prison Ministry Team is preparing to share God's love again with the men at the Greensville Correctional Center (GRCC), in Jarratt, VA, April 10 - 13. Your prayer support for this weekend is critically important. If you would like to have your name included on the Prayer Chain that is shared with the men at GRCC, so they can visibly see that many people are praying for them throughout the weekend, sign the Prayer Chain sign-up list on the table under the video screen in the Atrium. Also, the Annandale UMC Team is responsible for baking 700 dozen homemade cookies. Cookies are a tangible expression of our love and the only gift that Kairos can give to inmates. A cookie sign-up sheet, prison approved cookie recipes, and instructions are also on the table in the Atrium. If you cannot bake cookies but want to make a donation for baking supplies, make your check payable to AUMC, designated for Kairos Cookies, by Sunday, March 30. Other church members and team members will do the baking! Place your cookies, one dozen per quart freezer bag, in the AUMC kitchen freezer by Sunday, April 6 and label them "Kairos Cookies." Providing Safe Drinking Water

Last fall, AUMC's Earth and Spirit Committee launched a campaign to raise funds to purchase drinking water filters for the people of northern Ghana. The goal was to purchase 25 filters, at a cost of \$250 each, for a total of \$6,250. Last month the Committee was notified that the funds raised at AUMC will be used in 27 households in a part of the world where the need for safe drinking water is critical. Thank you to all who donated to this effort!

Around the world, 900 million people lack access to safe drinking water and 2.5 billion have inadequate sanitation, leading to water contaminated with deadly bacteria such as E. Coli. Every 20 seconds, a child dies of preventable water-borne disease. The water filtration devices can provide clean, safe water for a family of 4-6 every day for more than 10 years.

The filters are distributed in Ghana by World Vision, the largest non-governmental organization providing clean water and other assistance in the developing world. World Vision is an evangelical Christian organization working in more than 100 countries around the world.
