STOP HUNGER NOW, May 31

"When people were hungry, Jesus didn't say, "Now is that political, or social?" He said, "I feed you." Because the good news to a hungry person is bread." - Desmond Tutu.

Almost 1 billion people across the globe will go to bed hungry tonight, 200 million of them children, according to USAID (2013). Undernourishment kills more people every year than malaria, tuberculosis and AIDS combined (USAID, 2012). But we can help! Stop Hunger Now packaged and distributed 25 million meals in 2012 and 29 million in 2013. All of these meals were packaged by groups like ours. We will be packaging over 80,000 meals at AUMC and many hands make light work.



Please join other AUMC members, friends and neighbors at AUMC's Stop Hunger Now meal packaging event on **Saturday, May 31, from 8:45 a.m. until 1 p.m. in Wright Hall.** We can help end hunger by packaging and distributing meals to hungry people all over the world. The Stop Hunger Now organization (<http://www.stophungernow.org/>) has perfected a low cost, (25 cents per meal) highly nutritious meal of dehydrated rice and soy meal that can be easily shipped and stored. The meals are shipped

worldwide to respond to food crises and to provide school meals critical to enabling children to get an education.

Please come ready to work at 8:45 a.m. There are several different tasks to choose from. A refreshment table for volunteers will be set up during the meal packaging event and donations of baked goods, fresh fruit, granola bars, and other snacks are needed. Drop off donations of refreshments on Friday, May 30, in the kitchen or Saturday morning, May 31 in the Coffee Café off the atrium. Part of the Body of Christ

For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ.

- 1 Corinthians 12:12

"I can't believe you brought me to a place full of liars, thieves, and sinners!" That was the reaction of my devout Roman Catholic grandfather the first time he visited a Methodist church with my faithful grandmother. Everything was going smoothly but when the time of testimonies came, a lot of stories of wrong turns, wrong friends, and wrong decisions were told. After hearing this, my grandpa had enough grounds to settle his case: that church was unnecessary. "It's just a place full of imperfect people."

We are in the midst of our "Name That Sermon" series and I must thank you for all of your sermon ideas. It is very energizing to read your topics and opinions. We are indeed a very diverse bunch! I also feel energized when I get a chance to interact with people who do not have a church community. As soon as I say that I'm a pastor, it's usually followed by "so, you do all the work?" I laugh and reply, "certainly... NOT!" It seems as if the church has this image that only its leaders do the work or that only good people are sitting in the pews. Really? Is that what we've become?



Paul reminds us of our responsibility to one another as parts of the body of Christ. Just imagine if you wanted to take a drink from a glass of water and your hand decided not to work? Or what if you have an itch on your neck but your arm decided to take the day off? Our body works in wonderful and amazing ways, together; the thoughts turn into electrical impulses that move throughout the body to trigger the desired movement in the arm. So it is with the

body of Christ. We are all connected in one way or another, some are prophets, apostles, teachers, caregivers and so on. If we do not have these different workers coming together, then the circuit is incomplete and the Body doesn't work properly. It is in this diversity that the body of Christ thrives in our communities. Whether it is writing down an upcoming sermon topic that ends up inspiring someone in our congregation, or packing dry food for a Stop Hunger Now event, or marching for economic and racial justice (as 8,000 UMW did just a few weeks ago), when the miscellaneous body of Christ comes together, powerful things happen.

My granddad was right; the church is definitely imperfect. We have our rough edges and we have taken a wrong turn once or twice. And this group of rough-edged, imperfect people is supposed to somehow come together to work as Christ's Church. We might not see eye to eye on everything, but we must be able to put aside our differences and be able to see Christ in each other and the need for His joy in the world around us. Being part of the Body of Christ does not give us a free pass to sit in the pew and let the pastor work, or to not participate in a ministry because we don't agree with the opinions of the person working next to us; it gives us forgiveness, belonging and accountability for one another. I'm a member of the Body of Christ, and though different from you, we are equals in that Body.
