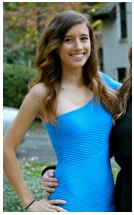

Michael McGaffic will graduate from Osbourn Park High School in Manassas and plans to attend The Citadel.



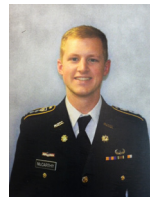

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“LET YOUR LIFE SPEAK”

Some time when the river is ice ask me what mistakes I have made. Ask me whether what I have done is my life. -William Stafford

Dear Friends,

We are in the midst of graduation season. This Sunday, our church will acknowledge high school graduates who are achieving that important milestone and will be leaving home to attend college in the fall. In fact, many individuals will walk across the stage, over the next few weeks, to receive high school, college, and graduate diplomas. With these seals of approval, they will proceed into the world to lead lives worthy of the educational institutions that have so endowed them. Undoubtedly, doors of opportunity will open, and they will decide where to enter.

Earlier this year, the pastors led a sermon series titled “Living with Passion and Purpose.” One of the books on the recommended reading list offered timely advice: “Let your life speak.” The phrase is an old Quaker maxim. It is also the title of Parker Palmer’s book on discerning life vocation.* Parker advises that vocation is not a goal one pursues. It is not an act of will or determination that one’s life will go in a prescribed direction. Rather, vocation requires listening. Rooted in the Latin word for voice, vocation is a calling that one hears. Palmer advises, “Before I can tell my life what I want to do with it, I must listen to my life telling me who I am.”

Palmer cautions that one can misread this statement. At first glance, it sounds like a call to action. It sounds like a reminder that actions speak louder than words, and we must get about the business of doing something. However, in a culture that focuses so much on doing, Parker reminds us of the importance of first listening. Otherwise, our doing becomes busy work, and we risk leading lives that do not reflect our true selves.

Would that I had heard this advice when graduating from high school! Perhaps I would have paused and listened, not to the voice of other people’s expectations and definitions of who I am meant to be, but to the inner voice of who God created me to be. Society, peers, and media will attempt to tell us who we are. Mentors and loved ones will affirm our gifts and advise us along the way. Ultimately, however, the voice of vocation must come from within.

Therefore, to listen to the voice of vocation requires an inner life of prayer, meditation, and study. It may also require patience, as our lives will speak over weeks, months, even years.

Like the poet above (also quoted in Palmer’s book), we may all pause one day and say, “Ask me whether what I have

done is my life.” Read: not my friend’s life, my mentor’s life, or the life that society says I should lead. We are all called to lead lives that reflect our true selves, the person God created us to be. Therefore, let your life speak...and listen.
