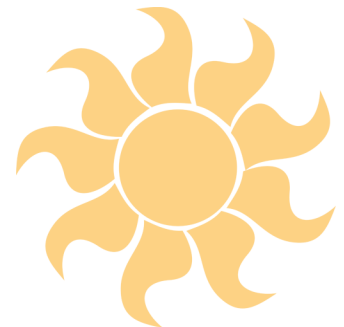
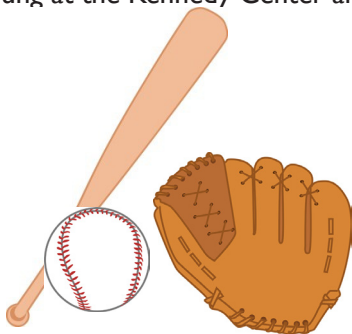

The Currency of Truth

Grace and peace in the name of our Savior!

I continue here our mutual exploration of Eric Law's helpful, holistic offering on stewardship

entitled *Holy Currencies: Six Blessings for Sustainable Missional Ministries* (St. Louis: Chalice Press, 2013). We have reviewed the currencies of time and place, relationships, wellness and leadership. This day we wrestle with something more nuanced: the currency of truth.

Law begins the chapter with a quote from scripture. "I am the way, the truth, and the life." (John 14:6) He notes the often polarizing, one dimensional way the word "truth" can be used. He then contrasts it with a broader concept, pointing to the word in Hebrew and Chinese. The Hebrew word, he informs us, is a three letter word which utilized the first, middle, and last letters of the Hebrew alphabet. He draws from this that truth can often times not be a static element in time, but something that must be seen over a trajectory of experiences, pointing to the placement of "the truth" in between "the way" and "the life" in John's gospel. "Way" and "life" are not static points. They are multi-dimensional. As Law puts it, "A way is traveled through time; there is a direction, a movement from one place to another. A life is lived over a period of time in different places, and in relationships with different people" (p.31).

Similarly, he notes that the Chinese ideogram for truth contains two figures. The top figure is the ideogram for the number ten; the bottom is the ideogram for table. With ten being the number of completeness within the culture, Law suggests that truth necessitates multiple perspectives upon the matter on the table before us.

Using these two related concepts Law concludes that, for Christians, the process of discerning the truth involves two things: tracing the entire trajectory of the life of Jesus Christ – the beginning, the middle and the end (keeping in mind that the end was really a resurrected beginning). We must study his actions, his relationships, his willingness to lay down his life and his rising with love and grace. Second, to discern the truth we must be willing to become cruciform – to pattern our lives after that of Jesus. To be willing to extend ourselves in love, to see the other as God sees them and exhibit an unshakable faith in God.

In other words, truth for Law is seen as a journey – a faith journey that we are sharing together. It is truthfully worth pondering.

Bishop Young Jin Cho announced on March 10 that, effective July 1, the Rev. Jeffrey P. Mickle, pastor of St. Stephen's UMC in Burke on the Alexandria District, will be the new Alexandria District superintendent.

Mickle is a former chair of the conference Board of Ordained Ministry. He has served St. Stephen's since June 2007, having served previously in Shenandoah, as associate at Aldersgate in Alexandria, at Resurrection in Virginia Beach and Belmont in Richmond.

He is married to the Rev. Deborah Austin, who is also a United Methodist elder. They have two adult sons: Jon in Atlanta and Ben in Seattle.
