“Don’t let anyone look down on you because you are young, but set an example for the believers in speech, in conduct, in love, in faith and in purity.” -1 Timothy 4:12

Many of us can look back in our lives and remember the experiences that shaped who we are today. Maybe it was the relationship with a loved one. Maybe it was the encouragement of a teacher or pastor. Maybe it was the closing of one door, only to find another one opening. Whatever the experience was, it shaped some aspect of who we are today in 2012. However, what about those experiences that seemed to be so hard at the time? It could have been standing up to a bully, saying, “Yes,” to a task that seemed out of our league, or maybe doing something that you were the only one that chose to do it. It is in these hard moments of our lives that we find things out. We see traits in ourselves that we didn’t even know existed. We find out who our “true” friends really are. Maybe, just maybe, we begin to see what God truly has in store for us.

In a book called “Do Hard Things” brothers Alex and Brett Harris share this:

“In many ways you can deliver less than 100 percent and still get away with it—on a team, in youth group, at work, at home, in your personal and spiritual life... This choice goes right to the heart of what it means to be a rebelutionary. Without a doubt, pushing yourself to do more than is asked, expected, or required is nearly always a lonely choice. It can set you apart from friends, co-workers, other Christians, even family.”

Youth today hear too often statements like: “You can’t do that,” “Let an adult do that,” or “You are just a kid.” It is a statement like one of these that paralyzes the hopes and abilities of youth. Society has set such low standards and expectations of youth, that when they complete a task like making their bed, that is enough...now go play. It is then that the youth is told this lie that they can’t do much and that they don’t need to until they are an adult.

Why share this? The reason I share this with you is because on the upcoming ski trip, January 27-30, the youth of The Grid



will be challenged to “Do Hard Things.” On the Sunday of the ski trip, youth will break out into different groups and go through workshops focused in three areas: doing hard things at home, school, and our relationship with God and His church.
