## Stop Hunger Now

As many of you know, AUMC will host another **"Stop Hunger Now" meal packaging event on Saturday, Feb. 16**, and we invite YOU to be a part of a fun activity that provides life-bringing nutrition to children in need around the world.

Stop Hunger Now is an international hunger relief agency that has been fulfilling its commitment to end hunger for more than 14 years. Since 1998, the organization has coordinated the distribution of food and other lifesaving aid to children and families in countries all over the world.

**One SHN packaging event** can result in the packaging of more than 1,000,000 meals or product servings and provides over 70% of its meals to support transformational development programs such as school feeding programs, vocational training programs, early childhood development programs, orphanages, and medical clinics. Every year Stop Hunger Now reserves 10% of its projected meals to respond...

## Shrove

### Tuesday Pancake Supper

Shrove Tuesday (also known as Pancake Tuesday, Pancake Day, Mardi Gras, and Fat Tuesday) is the day preceding Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent. Everyone is invited to UMC's **Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper on Tuesday, Feb. 12**, at 5:45 - 6:30 p.m. In addition to pancakes, the evening will feature family activities, crafts, pancake races and a parade. The supper is sponsored by Children's Ministry and United Methodist Men and costs \$5 for adults, \$3 for children and \$15 maximum per family. Proceeds will go to the Lenten Mission Project supper ministry at Poe Middle School.

Pancakes are associated with the day preceding Lent because they were a way to use up rich foods such as eggs, milk, and sugar, before the fasting season of the 40 days of Lent.

## Alleluia Chains

During Lent we don't use the word "alleluia". Lent is a penitential period, and the church signifies that by removing some of the most joyful hymns with the word "alleluia". Joy increases at Easter and "alleluia" returns.

On Shrove Tuesday, children will make an "alleluia" chain with words and phrases that bring them joy. The "alleluia" chain will be "buried" and then raised up on Easter. Everyone is invited to visit the table in the Atrium or Wright Hall and make a link for the alleluia chain.

## Lenten Study

AUMC's Lenten Study 2013 will be based on the book *The Jesus I Never Knew* by Philip Yancey. Winner of the Gold Medallion Book of the Year Award, this book examines three

fundamental questions: who Jesus was, why he came, and what he left behind. Yancey realized that despite a lifetime attending Sunday school, he really had no idea who Jesus was. Step by step, scene by scene, Yancey probes the culture into which Jesus was born and grew to adulthood; his character and mission; teachings and miracles; his legacy--not just as history has told it, but as he himself intended it to be. Yancey concludes, "Jesus has rocked my own preconceptions and has made me ask

## Transfiguration Sunday

Transfiguration Sunday happens just before Ash Wednesday—just before starting Lent. I believe this is no

coincidence. A lot of us look at Lent as a way to give something up for God, but a lot of times we end up abstaining from sweets, over-spending, or Facebook. While there's nothing wrong with giving up these distractions to become closer with God, there is so much more to Lent.

In Luke 9:28-36, we read about Jesus going up to the mountain to pray. The transfiguration event takes place and Moses and Elijah appear. This scene astonishes Peter and his companions so much that they decide to create an altar—a place to bring offerings. It's important to note that Peter is not doing something odd or out of character for that time. It was customary to mark the spot where God's presence dwelled so that others could bring themselves before God.

Rather than just giving up something of your daily life during Lent, why not bring a spiritual practice into your life? As we enter Lent we need to prepare ourselves to be more responsive as Christians. Maybe your relationship with God needs a little bit of work, or perhaps you need to practice love, patience, and kindness more. Whatever stage you might be in life, I hope that you take time to consider how Lent could be better spent this year.

Think of the possibilities that are at hand and how many lives we can reach. Consider how we can each become more Christ-like and how our relationship with God can improve. Imagine how we can better practice ministry if we were spiritually renewed.

It is my prayer that you find time to pray on this and that your life may be transformed in the coming weeks. May your face be changed in a way that people see Christ in you and want to offer themselves back to God.

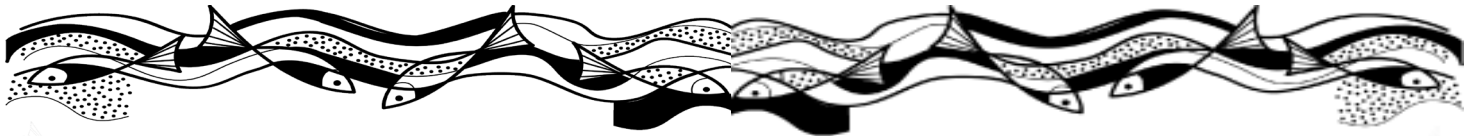

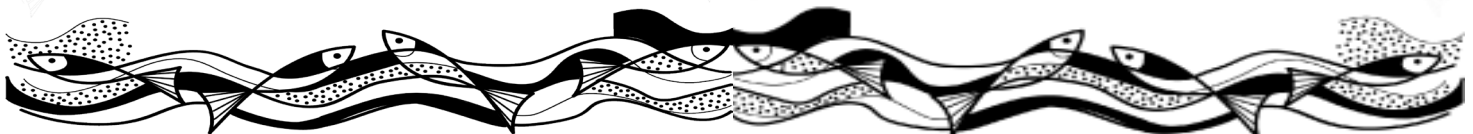

## AUMC Historic Tidbits: Reverend Coe

Edmund Gwynn Coe was Senior Minister here from 1914-1917\*. According to a 1914 edition of *The Yellow Jacket*, the Randolph Macon College student newspaper, next to his senior photo:

"This specimen of *homo omnivora* arrived in Ashland, Va., in the Fall of 1910 for the express purpose of twisting profs, and--well, a few other things. He achieved no small success in his native city by informing the public that it would be bad weather after the ground-hog had seen his shadow, and that there would be ice after the mercury had fallen below 0° Fahrenheit; but this is not all, for he had shown signal valor in taking a bath in the Potomac in order to save another from lying forever in a watery grave. But alack-a-day, how are the wicked risen around us!

"However upon his arrival in Ashland, Coe discovered that there was indeed much more in College life than hoo-dooing the Faculty, and he was immediately ensnared by the beams of Venus, together with the cannon-balls of Cupid. Natural results followed, Edmund soon became weary of life on the Campus, and decided that a little home on Dark and Muddy Street was better suited to his whims and fancies (it was too noisy on the Campus to study). And here in the calmness of his chateau he calmly takes six, seven, or eight classes each year, is pastor of about one-half of the churches in the Baltimore Conference, plays 'Rook,' and incidentally props his feet up to the fire and smokes his pipe of peace as any other *dad* would do."

Rev. Coe married in 1911, explaining the references to Cupid and Venus\*\*. An article in *The Baltimore Sun* on Sept. 11, 1909 confirms his tale of falling into the Potomac although it mentions no heroism, saying:

"Edmund G. Coe of the United States Weather Bureau had a narrow escape from drowning at Great Falls on the Potomac River today. While crossing a plank that had been thrown over one of the branches of the falls he lost his balance and fell into the water just above the place where the stream makes its leap. Mr. Coe was taken over with the current and swept into the whirlpool below. He returned to the surface only after having been carried about 100 feet by the undercurrent."
